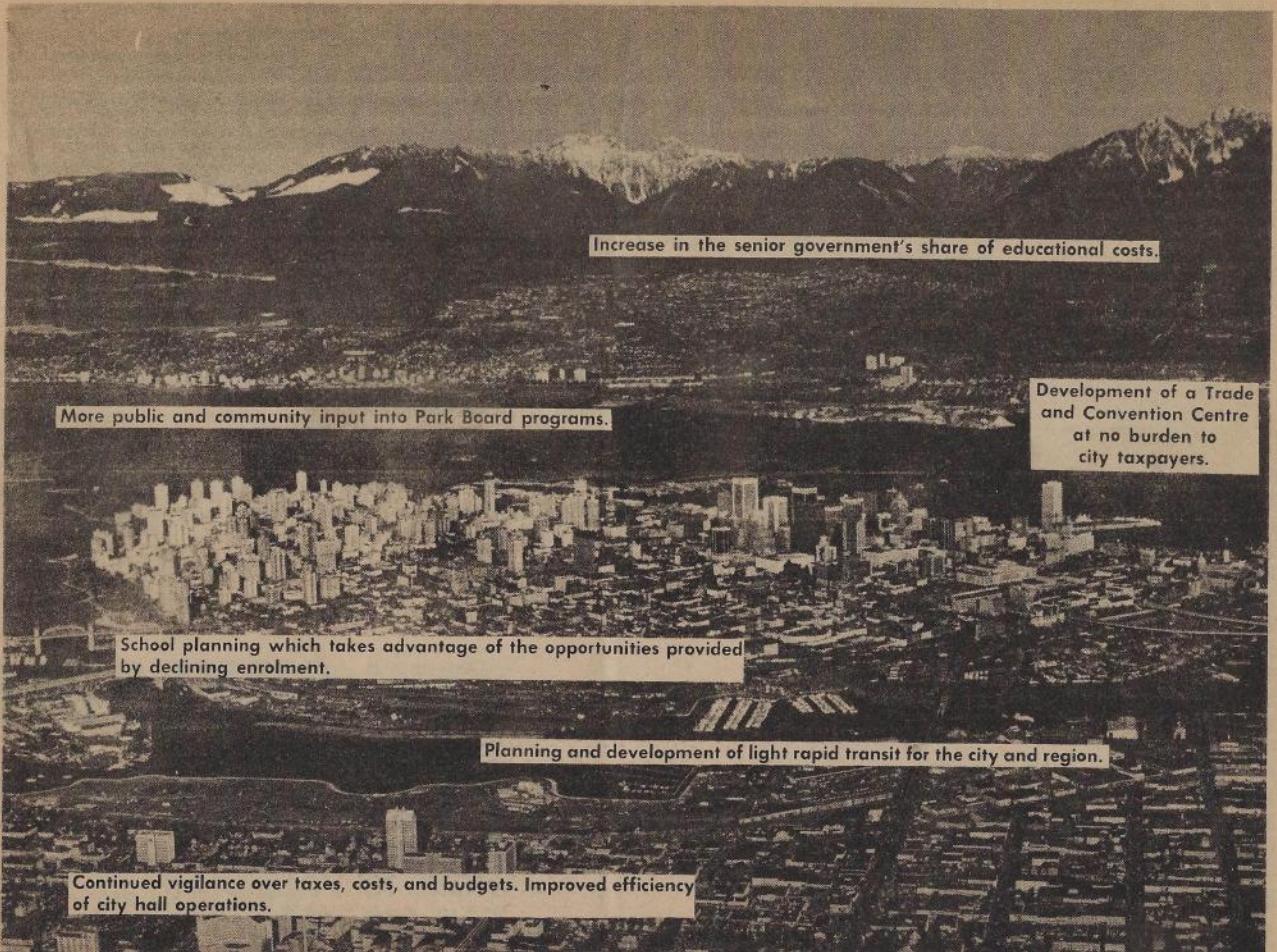

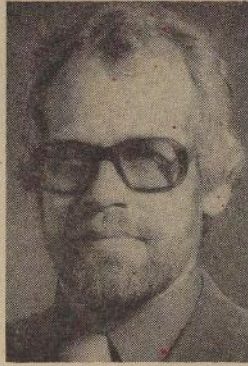

THE TEAM PARKS RECORD

Parks and Recreation have long been leading concerns of TEAM. During the 1977-1978 term, TEAM representatives have worked hard to achieve their goals, and have many successes to their credit.

They include:

- making the Board more open and accessible to all groups
- reviewing with community input, the Board's management procedures
- working with School Board on sensible use of recreation facilities
- rebuilding Kitsilano Pool and renovating the Kitsilano Community Centre
- renovating Percy Norman Pool
- upgrading tennis courts in many parks, and adding new ones
- remodelling Nat Bailey Stadium
- adding new facilities to Riley Park Community Centre
- building new skateboarding facilities in Nelson and China Creek Parks
- increasing parks' space on Granville Island.

Future Priorities:

- holding the line on new construction at a time of rising costs
- increasing park acreage in the West End and downtown core areas
- enlarging East Side waterfront parks
- making better use of existing staff and facilities
- planting programs for trees and flowers on Vancouver's boulevards
- developing "portable" parks to be used on vacant land for short periods.

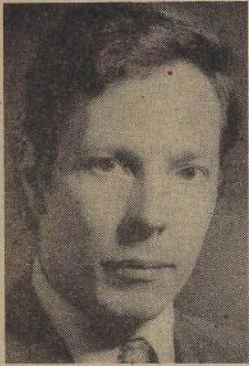

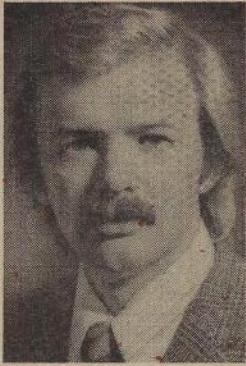

- improvement and extension of the Schools Consultative Committee process.

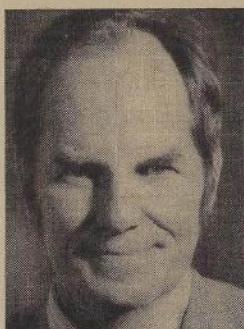

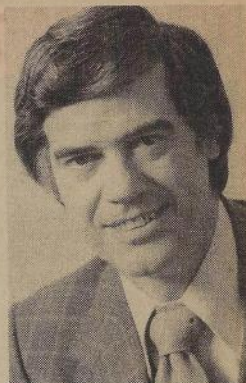

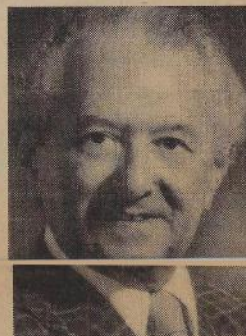
